



Years I Expect to Live

Based on your answers, how long you expect to live (this is also called survival) is important to you as you decide on your prostate cancer care. You should think about how long you expect to live based on your general health, not just your recent diagnosis \odot of prostate cancer.

Age and other things that affect survival

Many men with localized prostate cancer @ will live at least 10 years after their diagnosis. However, some men will die sooner for another reason, like advanced age, accidents, or other illnesses (for example, diabetes or heart disease). Unhealthy behaviors like tobacco use can also affect survival. There are certain tools, such as life tables, which list how long on average people will live based on their gender, race, and age. Your doctor may refer to such a table when he or she talks to you.

In general, prostate cancer is a slow-growing cancer. For men with a **low** risk of cancer spreading or returning, there is no proof that any one kind of care will help them live longer than another kind of care. In fact, for some men with very low risk cancer, treatment may cause more harm than good. For men with a medium to high risk (faster growing) cancer, studies show that removing or treating the cancer is better than not having treatment.

The most important thing that predicts the risk of your cancer growing or spreading is the Gleason score 2. There is good research that this score will predict the chance that a man's cancer will spread and how many years he will live. Your doctor will talk to you about your Gleason Score and risk of your cancer spreading or returning.

TALK TO YOUR DOCTOR


Talk to your doctor about your age and how long you expect to live. For example, you might say:

"I feel like a young man at ... (say your age) and like I've got many years to go. What does this have to do with my decision about prostate cancer care?"

Or you might say:

"I've had a full life, and now I am ... (say your age) (OR say) I've had a full life, and I have ... (say another disease or illness you have). I'm not sure I'm going to live many more years. Help me understand how this fits in my decision about prostate cancer care."
